Chair Melodie Darden reminded members of the Board of the ethical requirements for public servants and requested that members identify conflicts or potential conflicts of interest with respect to any item on the agenda. No board member expressed any potential or actual conflicts of interest.

FOUNDATION CHECK PRESENTATION

Chair Darden advised the Board there was a last-minute change and the presenter was unable to attend. This presentation will occur in the future.

RECOGNITIONS

A. Trustee Emeritus

Chair Darden explained to the Board the Trustee Emeritus distinction and the criteria for consideration. Chair Darden announced that the Board had bestowed the distinction upon former trustee, Dr. Matt Zettl. She said a few words about Dr. Zettl and his time on the Board. She presented him with a gift from the Board. Dr. Zettl was recognized to speak and said that he feels he got more out of participating on the Board than he felt like he put in it. Dr. Zettl thanked the Board. Dr. Mancini said that the Board will hang a commemorative plaque for the Trustees Emeritus in the Boardroom this spring.

B. Special Commendation

Trustee Bill Henderson was recognized to present a special commendation. Trustee Henderson asked Mr. Steve Sparks to come up front and welcomed Mrs. Kim Sparks to the meeting. Trustee Henderson read the commendation for Mr. Sparks, thanking him for his service to Carteret Community College and our community for the past 10 years.

C. Student Recognition

Dr. Maggie Brown was recognized to present the College's 2023 nominees of the North Carolina Community College System awards. For the Dallas Herring Achievement Award, Mya Pope was introduced and given the opportunity to say a few words. She expressed gratitude for her faculty and experience at Carteret CC. The criteria for this award include exemplary achievement; Ms. Pope will graduate with an Associate in Arts in May 2023. Dr. Brown recognized Mr. Anthony Pile for the Governor Robert W. Scott Student Leadership Award which includes student leadership and service as the criteria. Mr. Pile is the SGA President 2022-2023 and Student Board representative. He will graduate with an Associate in Science degree in May 2024. He thanked the College for opportunities and said he hopes to go to medical school after UNC-Chapel Hill.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Chair Darden presented the February 8, 2023, agenda for approval.

Trustee Jenkins made a motion to amend the agenda to include a closed session after Item VIII Board Comments pursuant to General Statute 143-318.11 section (a) (2) To prevent the premature disclosure of an honorary degree, scholarship, prize, or similar award. Trustee Comer seconded the motion. Without further discussion, the motion was unanimously approved by voice vote.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Chair Darden presented the January 11, 2023, minutes, and January 17, 2023, Personnel, Policies, & Bylaws minutes for approval by the Board.

Trustee Dee Meshaw made a motion to approve the minutes from January 11, 2023, and January 17, 2023 meetings as presented. Trustee Jenkins seconded the motion. Without further discussion, the motion was unanimously approved by voice vote.

CHAIR REPORT

Chair Darden thanked the Trustees who attended the NC Association of Community College President's Reception on January 25 at the Beaufort Hotel. Those trustees attending were Trustees Jenkins, Hooper, Henderson, and Darden. Also attending was State Board member Ann Whitford. Chair Darden shared with the Board that she also attended the dinner for the Presidents' Winter Meeting and was able to say a few words about the Escoffier program.

Chair Darden said she and Trustee Jenkins attended the first Escoffier Dinner. She commended student chef Caroline Juba for the confidence and poise she exhibited while doing food demonstrations. Chair Darden encouraged the Board to attend the dinners. February and March are sold out but there are still tickets for April.

Chair Darden advised the Board to let Dr. Mancini or Laura Sullivan know if they are able to attend the NCACCT Law/Legislative Seminar in Raleigh on March 29-31, 2023. She said that Trustees Jenkins, Comer, and herself would be attending.

Chair Darden thanked Trustee Dee Meshaw for attending the visit to Wayne Community College to look at their Automotive and Diesel facilities. Chair Darden advised the Board that Trustee Meshaw would be presenting at the Board Retreat about her visit.

Chair Darden thanked Trustee Henderson for sending a family member to Fort Macon on January 16, 2023, to pick up litter for the Martin Luther King Day of Service that the College sponsored.

Chair Darden thanked those who attended the Mary Mikels concert on January 20, 2023, at Joslyn Hall. It was a terrific concert and nice to celebrate a former student.

Chair Darden advised the Board that Foundation donation participation was up, with the Board of Trustees at number three, falling after the Foundation Board and Staff and Faculty. She encouraged the Board to participate no matter how small or large.

Chair Darden reminded the Board that the Annual Board Retreat is on February 22, 2023, from 8:30-12:00 in the McGee Boardroom.

Chair Darden, on behalf of the Board, thanked Mr. Steve Sparks for his professionalism. She wished him a happy retirement.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Trustee Mary Charles Jenkins was recognized to report from the Personnel, Policies, and Bylaws Committee. She advised the Board that they would be voting on the second reading of the Governing Policies. The corrections noted at

the January 11, 2023, Board meeting have been finished, but Trustee Jenkins said there were a few minor corrections that Mrs. Sullivan will correct. Trustee Jenkins provided a copy of the page that needed to be corrected.

Trustee Jenkins recommended to the Board that the Governing Policies be approved with noted minor corrections. The Board voted in favor of approving the Governing Policies unanimously by voice vote.

Trustee Jenkins gave an overview of the Joseph T. Barwick Award. There was a brief discussion about the Barwick Award. Trustee Jenkins advised the Board that this award had not been given out since 2020. The Board was provided an overview of the Award and a nomination form for the award. Nominations are due by February 28.

OTHER REPORTS

A. Foundation Liaison

Trustee Mary Charles Jenkins said the Foundation had not met since the last Board meeting. She updated the Board on upcoming Events. All of the Escoffier Dinners are sold out except April. On February 17, 2023, the Black History Committee and the Foundation are sponsoring the ZuZu African Acrobats at Joslyn Hall. This event is also sold out. Trustee Langston commented that she has received several calls from other counties that had groups that wanted to attend. She mentioned that in the future it would be nice to have more space for events like this to draw others here. Dr. Mancini commented that the response has been very good. Trustee Jenkins said that the second Celebration on the Sound this year is May 13, 2023. The headliners for this event are Chayce Beckham and Conner Smith. The local performers are Bryan Mayer and Jake Sutton. Tickets will go on sale later this month for Celebration on the Sound. Trustee Jenkins challenged the Board to participate in the Annual Fund Participation.

B. President's and Executive Leadership Council Reports

Dr. Mancini reported that the NC Association of Community College Presidents Winter Meeting hosted at Carteret CC on January 25-27, 2023, was a success. She received several emails from other presidents who remarked about the welcoming feel of the campus and the sense of teamwork from our faculty and staff. Approximately, 52 out of 58 presidents attended as well as State Board members and Community College System staff.

She reported that the Executive Leadership Council participated in a retreat February 2-3, 2023. They reviewed material about the facilities on campus, reviewed budget documents, and participated in teambuilding exercises.

Dr. Mancini said that good progress is being made on the replacement for Mr. Sparks. She thanked Trustee Henderson for participating in the initial selection process. She hopes to announce in the next couple of weeks a selection for this position.

Dr. Mancini said that Hospitality and Culinary Arts are among the growing programs at the College. Student enrollment has tripled, and there is growth in Continuing Education and Life Enrichment programs.

Dr. Mancini reported that the College had received several of Grants recently. The College received a Workforce Development Board Grant for \$97,000 to support re-entry programs for those who are exiting Carteret Correction Center. The College has received from the North Carolina State Board of Nursing approval for the Associate Degree in Nursing expansion. This program will now be able to officially have 100 students at a time in the nursing program. On February 2, the College received word about a Golden LEAF Foundation Community-Based Development Grant for \$750,000 for the next two years. It will pay for the additional two nursing instructors needed for Nursing Program expansion for two years, a simulation coordinator, and equipment for a simulation lab. In addition, she commended

Christine Turner, chair of the Emergency Science program, for receiving final approval of national accreditation by CAAHEP. This will set the College apart from other Community Colleges that have the EMS-Paramedic program.

Dr. Mancini reported that the Paralegal Technology program has received approval from the ABA to begin offering a Legal Studies Pathway for Career and College Promise students. The College also received a grant from the Carlyle Adams Foundation for \$225,000 to support a camp coordinator for camps and community outreach for three years.

Dr. Mancini advised the Board about the topics that would be covered at the upcoming Board Retreat on February 22, 2023. She also said that the purchase of 103 South Lockhart Street in Morehead City was completed, and the deed was recorded on January 25, 2023.

C. Faculty Executive Committee

Christine Turner, Chair of the Faculty Executive Committee, was recognized for a presentation. She reported that Faculty member Trisha Miller had composed an updated course syllabi template for each division. The Deans and Dr. Brown have reviewed it and now are working through ADA compliance with IT. The new syllabus should be implemented in the Summer of 2023. Faculty have worked diligently to bring back two forms of plagiarism detection software. The software will help to secure online testing and provide plagiarism screening and a detector for written assignments. Faculty have submitted nominees for the State Academic Excellence Award, Dallas Herring Award, and the Governor Robert Scott Award. A subcommittee has been formed to review and revise the Faculty handbook.

BOARD COMMENTS

Trustee Henderson thanked Mr. Steve Sparks for his service to the College.

Trustee Jenkins thanked Dr. Matt Zettl for being at the meeting and congratulated him on being named Trustee Emeritus, a well deserved honor.

Trustee Parker agreed with the others and thanked both Mr. Sparks and Dr. Zettl for their service and everything they did for the College.

Trustee Hooper wanted to highlight Dr. Mancini's report. Trustee Hooper did not realize all that was being done at the College.

Trustee Long thanked Mr. Sparks for all that he had done for the College over the past 10 years.

Trustee Starcke echoed everyone's comments and congratulated Dr. Zettl with hats off to Mr. Sparks on retirement and appreciation for all that he has done.

Mr. Anthony Pile wanted to highlight Dr. Mancini's report, especially the part about the grant from the Workforce Development Board to support re-entry programs.

Trustee Brady thanked Dr. Zettl and Mr. Sparks and congratulated Ms. Mya Pope and Mr. Anthony Pile for excelling in school and being nominated for the NCCCS Awards. Congratulations to the faculty and staff for all the grant opportunities.

Trustee Meshaw thanked Dr. Zettl and Mr. Sparks and is looking forward to the Board Retreat.

Trustee Langston said she agreed with everything that had been said and that she was really impressed with Dr. Mancini's report especially the information on the grants the College has received.

Trustee Comer said he agreed with Mr. Pile about the Workforce Development Board Grants to support re-entry programs. He also thanked Dr. Zettl and Mr. Sparks.

Trustee Johnson said she has enjoyed knowing Dr. Zettl and Mr. Sparks and she was excited about the Nursing program growth.

Chair Darden thanked the faculty and staff for all that they are offering. She thanked Ms. Turner for her presentation and was grateful for the accreditation of the EMS program.

CLOSED SESSION

A motion was made to go into Closed Session at 10:05 a.m. pursuant to General Statute 143-318.11 section (a) (2) by Trustee Comer and was seconded by Trustee Langston. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

Those others asked to stay were Dr. Mancini and Mrs. Sullivan.

A motion was made to come out of Closed Session at 10:37 a.m. by Trustee Comer and seconded by Trustee Meshaw. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

ADJOURNMENT

Chair Darden asked for a motion to adjourn.

Trustee Hooper made a motion to adjourn at 10:38 a.m. Trustee Meshaw seconded the motion. Without further discussion, the motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

CURRICULUM SUBCOMMITTEE AND BOT APPROVAL REQUIRED

New Program Approval

The English, Communication, and Education Chair and our Early Childhood Advisory Committee has reviewed a new stand-alone certificate created by the NCCCS, C55820 Early Childcare Workforce and recommends that the College apply to offer this program effective Fall 2023.

The program consists of 6 courses, 2 of which would be new to our catalog.

EDU 119 Introduction to Early Childhood 4 SHC

EDU 130 Social Environments for Children 3 SHC-new to catalog

EDU 151 Creative Activities 3 SHC

EDU 159 Health and Safety for Early Childhood 2 SHC-new to catalog

EDU 162 Observation and Assessment in ECE 3 SHC

EDU 188 Trends and Policies in Early Childhood 3 SHC-EDU 188 currently in catalog

but SO has updated course title, description, and credit hours

We feel that this certificate better prepares students to enter the workforce with licensed childcare agencies and contains the appropriate number of hours for both licensure and lead teacher certification. The System Office also created this certificate so that it would meet the requirements for PELL funding and will be releasing that financial aid determination in the next week or two. The current EC certificate is not eligible for Pell aid.

Students in the current EC certificate will complete their courses this summer. All incoming students with an interest in entering the childcare workforce would be advised to go into the new certificate, pending approval.

The program content does not represent a significant departure from our current EDU offerings, requires no additional faculty or facilities, and does not represent a substantive change for SACS COC.

INFORMATION ITEMS

1. We have submitted a request to the System Office to review the tier funding for Aquaculture. We have provided documentation which we believe would put these courses into the same tier as lab sciences, Tier 1B. Currently the courses are classified in Tier 2 with languages, business, and other courses that do not rely on lab-based equipment.

For the current year, Tier 2 is funded at \$3,761 per FTE; Tier 1B is funded at \$4,325 per FTE.

- 2. We have received approval from the American Bar Association to offer our first CCP pathway toward the Paralegal program. This certificate will be called Legal Studies.
- 3. Our Human Services AAS is capitalizing on its 2 + 2 agreement with UNCW's BS in Social Work by adding a Social Work concentration.

SUBJECT: Board of Trustees March 8, 2023, Meeting

On the day I write this report, March 3, it is **National Employee Appreciation Day**. **Carteret Community College employees** continue to shine, and I wish to express deep appreciation for their dedication, creativity, and teamwork. Our faculty and staff go above and beyond every day to help transform lives through positive and responsive customer service and excellent instruction. They serve on campus and off to provide resources to everyone in our service area, often representing Carteret CC on local, regional, and statewide committees to ensure we stay current and provide input to decisions that will affect our students and college.

This month I would like to commend two members of the senior leadership team for their statewide involvement. **VP Perry Harker** has been re-appointed by the NC Community College System to serve as one of three Continuing Education vice presidents representing the Eastern Region on the statewide **Workforce Development Leadership Committee**. This committee reviews and recommends state workforce policy and initiatives and recommends new or modified workforce courses and programs for State Board of Community Colleges approval. **VP Dr. Maggie Brown** has been appointed by the NC Community College System to serve on the **Transfer Advisory Committee (TAC)**, an eight-member statewide committee that interprets and reinforces the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement and ensures seamless transfer of community college general education course credits to 16 UNC institutions and more than 30 independent colleges and universities in the state. Both Mr. Harker and Dr. Brown have impeccable reputations and strong work ethics, and Carteret CC is fortunate to experience their leadership on and off campus.

You may recall that last month we reported that **Tony Pile**, current Student Government Association president and student Trustee, was Carteret CC's nominee for the **Governor Robert Scott Student Leadership Award**. This week we heard from the System Office that Mr. Pile is one of five finalists for the statewide Governor Scott Award! We are proud that he represents Carteret CC and will look forward to his continued success.

Kudos to our **Basic Skills Program**, also known as **College and Career Readiness**. Under the leadership of **Diane Matlock**, student enrollment and success has risen the past three years, with fall FTE increasing by 6% in 2020, 11% in 2021, and 33% in 2022. Students in this program complete high school diplomas and equivalency certificates that enable them to pursue additional education and secure better jobs.

The annual **Board of Trustees Retreat** held on February 22 was a success. Thank you to our Trustees for taking time to discuss data related to college enrollments, employee salaries, state legislative priorities, program needs, and workforce programs offered through the NC Community College System. **Dr. Bruce Mack** provided valuable information about the state's Customized Training Program, Small Business Centers, and Apprenticeships.

This month, Carteret CC is pleased to host the statewide **Small Business Center Network conference** on campus. I received a letter from **Mrs. Ann Shaw**, state director of the SBCN, with the following message:

I want to thank you for your leadership that allows **Brandy Bell** to be innovative, collaborative, and a true trailblazer in supporting small businesses and in being a resource to other SBC Directors. She has done an unparalleled job leading the professional development committee for the SBCN and planning every detail of this conference.

As I know you are aware, Carteret CC was among the first 8 colleges to receive funding for a Small Business Center in 1984. The years have flown by, but Carteret CC will always be known as one of the pioneers in providing entrepreneurial assistance to small business owners and prospective owners. Next year, we will celebrate 40 years of serving the state's entrepreneurs. We thank you for the role Carteret CC has played as a mover and doer in economic development.

SUBJECT: Corporate and Community Education March Board Report

Carteret Community College recently received a \$95,000 grant from the Eastern Carolina Workforce Development Board Inc. The grant aims to help citizens successfully re-enter society following their incarceration. A significant focus will be connecting participants to various community resources, workforce training programs, and job placement.

We hosted a successful job fair for the North Carolina Ferry System in partnership with NCWorks. Several qualified applicants visited the Big Rock Career Center during the event. This is the third year we have held a successful job fair for the Ferry System. The Ferry leadership where delighted with the turnout and hiring opportunities.

The North Carolina Community College System Office re-appointed Perry Harker to serve on their Workforce Development Leadership Committee. This committee reviews and recommends state workforce policy and initiatives and recommends new or modified workforce courses/programs request for state board approval. In addition, he is one of three Continuing Education VPs representing the Eastern Region.

In February, we provided Forklift Operator Certification classes for twenty-eight Town of Morehead City employees and nine NC Aquarium employees at Pine Knoll Shores.

The College will host the North Carolina Community College System Small Business Center Network Spring 2023 Conference, March 8–10, at the Hospitality and Culinary Center. We anticipate representatives from all 58 Community Colleges and System Office Staff will attend.

We are working with Carteret County Government to help recruit and train workers for their Building Code Inspections Department and Telecommunications (911) Center. Our first Building Code Inspection Certification course will start in mid-March, and the Telecommunication Certification class will begin in late April. The long-term plan is to schedule classes in both areas each semester to allow those wanting to work in the field the opportunity to obtain the certifications needed for these respective departments.

We provided Notary Public Certification training to eleven employees of the Carteret County Government.

We will provide a National Association of EMT (NAEMT) course to emergency personnel at Cherry Point through an Instructional Service Agreement with Craven CC. We are the nearest NAEMT-authorized training site in our region.

The WIOA program has enrolled 35 new participants so far this program year and is currently serving 53 carry-over participants.

Massage Therapy students are starting to book chair massages for local schools and businesses. Tiller, Carteret Health Care, Gramercy, Croatan, and East Carteret High School are confirmed.

We are working with a department from Fleet Readiness Center East to provide American Welding Society Certification Testing and certification. The group of employees is training at our welding facility.

Students enrolled in our Professional Bartending class were the bartenders for our second Escoffier Dinner. It was a fantastic way to give them real-life experiences.

We are working with Emerald Isle Reality to provide training for their seasonal housekeepers. There are 150 seasonal employees we will be training over the next couple of months. The classes are held in the Hotel Room Lab in our Hospitality Center.

Shana and I met with Jim Dandy stores and will be scheduling ServSafe Certification training for several of their employees. In addition, we will develop and deliver leadership training classes for their managers.

Our Women on the Water classes are seeing strong interest and enrollment. We completed one class in February and three more scheduled for Spring.

We received grant funding of \$141,000 in partnership with NC Sea Grant and East Carolina University to begin offering a Living Shoreline Academy. The Academy will introduce Living Shorelines, including living shoreline theory, construction, and permitting processes. In addition, students will work with Carteret CC Horticulture instructors to learn how to produce various types of marsh plants. Finally, students will learn in the classroom, lab, and field while earning a Certification in Living Shorelines.

Our Captain's certification classes continue to grow, with sixty-one students registered for classes in January & February.

The committee invited Dr. Tracy Mancini, CCC President and Amanda Bryant Director of Human Resources to discuss and answer questions about the bi-weekly timesheets required for non-exempt employees. We were informed that it was federally mandated that a record of compensatory time be kept for employees, because it is required that non-exempt employees be compensated for this overtime. Instead of compensating for overtime monetarily, the college has elected to compensate overtime with leave time in the form of compensatory hours. If employees need to complete work that will cause overtime to accrue (working over 40 hours in one week), then it must be cleared with the employee's supervisor before the overtime is worked.
